Investment pays dividends for everyone

EDITOR'S NOTE: This column is a feature on stories from the Association's Oral History program.

Carroll V. "CV" Glines

invested \$40 for a 10th interest in a Piper J-2 aircraft in 1939. The dividends have been a thousand fold — for him, the Air Force and the American public.

Two decades of his 27-year Air Force career were in operational assignments. He flew P-40s and P-47s in Panama and Europe during World War II before moving into B-25s and B-26s. He even managed some time in the jet-powered P-80.

His love of flying deterred him from a journalism career, except on a freelance basis.

His first check followed an article he wrote on a speech he had given at Air Command and Staff School. He asked the Air Inspector if he could accept it.

"He asked if I had written it on my own time," said **Glines**, "and did I use my own typewriter and paper. When I assured him I had, he said sign the check and keep on writing. I've been writing on a free-lance basis ever since."

In 1961, **Glines** met with SAF/OI's **Col. Pug Evans** and **Maj. Gen. Arno Luehman**.

"I told them I was in Ops, but that I was interested in getting into Information. And with my background in writing articles and books, I thought I might be useful." The switch was made.

His first "project" proved to be a lulu. **Secretary Eugene Zuckert** wanted a Command Services Unit and a Communications Studies Group and he wanted it to be at Bolling AFB.

"As I recall," said **Glines**, "we had authority for 75 people." The search was on for a building to house them.

Fixed-wing flying had been terminated at Bolling and it didn't take long for an old Ops man to zero in on the old Base Ops building. He met

resistance from every quarter on base. He found a quick solution.

"I would ask the individual giving me a hard time for his name, rank and serial number because I want to be able to tell the Secretary exactly what you just told me," he said. "Invariably they would back off."

SAF/OI Director Maj. Gen. William K. Martin offered him the CO's job of the new unit.

"I told him I would rather stay in the Pentagon and since **Jim Sunderman** is leaving, I'd like to be in Mags and Books." **Martin** concurred and **Col. John Caufield** became CSU's first commander.

Mags and Books was a perfect fit for **Glines**. In 1964, DoD's **Art Sylvester**, assistant secretary for Public Affairs, convinced **Secretary Robert McNamara** that magazines and books, motion pictures and photography from all services should be in DoD.

Glines left the Pentagon in 1966 and after two years as chief of Public Affairs at Alaskan Command, he retired as a colonel.

His value to the Air Force increased after retirement, as he edited several national flying publications, and authored more than 30 books and nearly 800 articles for national magazines.

He assisted **Generals Ben Foulois** and **Jimmy Doolittle** writing their autobiographies.

His association with **Doolittle** can be measured by his honorary

membership in the Doolittle Raiders, for which he is the group's historian.

While still on active duty he became aware of 80 silver goblets on display at the Air Force Academy.

"Each goblet is engraved so you can read them when they are upside down," he said "Each year when somebody dies, they have a ceremony and turn it over and drink a toast. There's a bottle of brandy, dated 1896, which was the boss's birthday. The last two were to drink the bottle of brandy."

Glines was surprised to learn that "Thirty Seconds Over Tokyo" was the only book written about the Tokyo raid. It was **Ted Lawson's** personal

account and it came out in 1943.

He was caught up in this idea of doing a book and presented his case at the annual meeting. "**Doolittle** put his arm around my shoulder and said, 'You all know I only have one vote in this room, but I vote for this young fellow.' The vote was unanimous.

"Doolittle's Tokyo Raiders" was followed by "Four Came Home," detailing those held prisoners by the Japanese after the raid.

"I did a biography of **Jimmy** called 'Jimmy Doolittle, Master of the Calculated Risk' and then I did another book called 'The Doolittle Raid' in '88," he said.

"It seems like almost everything he (**Doolittle**) said was an honest statement. I think his honesty and integrity were the two principal things that came across in every interview I ever had with him."

Glines continues his writing in Dallas where he also serves as curator for the Doolittle Military Aviation Library at the University of Texas.

Membership elects new board members

Recently elected board members and a new slate of Association officers began their terms of office on July 1, 2002.

Elected to two-year terms on the 11-person Board of Directors were incumbents **Larry Greer, Jim McGuire and Joe Purka** plus new board members **John Gulick, Jim Hart and Charley Powers**.

The six newly elected members

join **Linda Arnold, Al Eakle, Rick Fuller, Mike Gannon and Dave Smith** on the Association's Board.

Members of AFPAAA's 11-person board serve staggered two year terms.

Six positions are up for election on even numbered years and five positions on odd-numbered years.

Each year the members of the board elect a new Secretary who

becomes part of the Association's leadership succession program.

Each year the previous year's officers move up to the next position with the departing Chairman moving to Emeritus status as an ex-officio board member.

Leading the Association in the coming year will be **Purka**, Chairman of the Board; **Smith**, President; **Fuller**, Vice President and **Gannon**, Secretary.

Memorial honors professionals killed in the line of duty

The Public Affairs Memorial Selection Committee is now accepting nominations for recognizing Public Affairs, Broadcast and Band personnel who were killed in the line of duty.

The USAF Public Affairs Memorial is sponsored by the Air Force Public Affairs Alumni Association as a tribute to those men and women who have died on an official public affairs assignment whether by hostile fire or in a duty related accident/incident.

AFPAAA's PA Memorial project chair, **Ed Johnson**, advises

that nominations, at a minimum, should include the nominee's name, rank and service number, a detailed description of the circumstances and explanation of why the individual is being nominated. *The Selection Committee will also seek corroborating information from official records.*

Nominations should be sent to AFPAAA, P.O. Box 540, Fairfax, VA 22030-0540 and marked "PA Memorial" on the envelope. A full text of the PA Memorial document will be posted on the AFPAAA web site.

Members of the PA Memorial selection committee are **Ed Johnson**,

chair; **Reed Switzer; Carey Deckard; Hugh Burns;** and **William H. Campbell**.

The location of the memorial is not established at this time and final design will have to fit in the space available.

Minutes of the annual membership meeting

President Joe Purka called the meeting to order at 1:30 p.m. on June 1, 2002, in the Rose Garden room of the Adams' Mark Hotel in San Antonio, Texas. A quorum was declared to be present.

Secretary Rick Fuller read the names of the members of the Air Force Public Affairs community who had died since the last annual meeting.

These included: **Col. Reade F. Tilly, Ben G. Wright, Col. Frank M. Maxwell, Joseph F. Murphy, Constance Hardwick Luehman, Traudl Karolyi-Halbert, Chief Master Sgt. Alton C. "Al" Stromwall, Col. Paul M. Covell, Dottie Flanagan, and John Corcoran .**

Members were asked to add names of others who had died.

Additional names from the floor were: **Nancy Maypole, Dennis McLenden, Chan Chandler, Dennis Cruikshank, and Jay Chiat.**

A moment of silence was observed to remember the deceased and in their memory.

The financial report was presented by **President Purka** on behalf of **Treasurer Jim Hart**, who had to leave the conference due to the death of a close family member.

The report as of the May 31, 2002 follows:

Treasurer's Report

AFPAAA is in very good financial condition.

As of May 31, 2002, the association had \$154,223.90 in total assets. This includes \$32,244.67 in the Bank of America checking account, \$15,191.19 in bonds and \$106,788.04 in a money market fund at Morgan Stanley.

At the time of the report bills for the annual meeting had not been paid. These were expected to be approximately \$17,200.

Association President's Award to Terry Hemeyer. His citation read: "Whereas, he was the first Air Force public affairs officer to also serve as an Air Force band conductor, and Whereas, he initiated the Air Force media training program which is today required attendance by all Air Force general officers, and Whereas, he distinguished himself as a superior public affairs professional in the Air Force and in industry, Therefore, in recognition of his many accomplishments, we declare Terry Hemeyer to be a Public Affairs Pioneer."

His citation read "Whereas, he was solely responsible for producing Air Force News Service serving 400 Air Force newspapers from 1966 to 1972, and Whereas, he initiated the position of public affairs advisor to the Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force, and Whereas, with his wife, Mary, has hosted the Outstanding Airmen and their spouses during the annual Air Force Association Convention for more than three decades, Therefore, in recognition of his many accomplishments, we declare Charles E. "Chuck" Lucas to be a Public Affairs Pioneer.

Income from registration was approximately \$17,900. Additionally, corporate sponsors donated a total of \$5,000.

A full accounting, including corporate donations will be given in the June 30, 2002 quarterly financial statement.

Vice President Dave Smith gave the membership report on behalf of the **Membership Committee Chairman Neil Buttimer.**

Current membership is 661: of that number, 468 are full members; and 193 are associate members.

Of the full members, 104 are lifetime founders, 59 are lifetime members, and 10 are in the lifetime payment plan.

Last year, 211 members were up for renewal. About 75 percent renewed their membership. A total of 54 did not renew (16 full members and 38 associate.) We also added 52 new members since September, 48 of whom joined after December.

There are 261 memberships up for renewal this year: 153 full memberships; and 108 associate. We hope to continue to recapture 75-80 percent of these members.

We plan to publish an update to the directory this summer. Members

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who have moved are asked to provide their new addresses to the membership committee or may provide the information via the web page or by e-mailing : dirupdate@afpaaa.org.

There were a number of recommendations on how to improve recruiting efforts.

Roy Witton recommended that members with the resources provide free memberships to active duty and reserve members as one way of introducing them to the Association.

Communications Committee Chairman Al Eakle reported the production schedule for the newsletter has been placed on the web site.

Mike Gannon reported that the new recruiting brochure was nearing completion and would be reviewed by the board in the next several weeks. A volunteer who is on the graphics staff at DINFOS designed it. The goal is to have a professional brochure to entice those eligible to join.

The president noted that

Gura then discussed that the annual meeting for 2003 would be held in Las Vegas on May 1, 2, and 3. The meeting will be at the Embassy Suites. The contracted cost per room will be \$131, a little higher than normal, but this includes a daily cooked to order breakfast and afternoon "happy hour."

In addition, parking is free, and there is a free shuttle to and from the airport and the "strip" so that cost to the individual may actually be less than for most annual meetings.

President Purka announced that an East Coast site would be sought for the 2004 annual meeting. Potential locations range from Langley and Pope AFBs to a location in the Florida Panhandle.

Purka gave a report on the endowment fund. To date, 62 members have donated \$128,571. Because of the market downturn, the value of the endowment has decreased to \$106,788.

The president noted that the association was not unique, pointing

reported that now that he was completing his term as chairman of the board he would be revitalizing the oral history program. Info on the program is on the web site.

He also reported that he hoped to continue to work with **Chuck Lucas** and others to summarize the histories and have them appear in the newsletter.

Chairman Gura also reported that there would be new web site services available soon. There was also a discussion on the directory and the availability of the

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out that endowments for major universities have similarly been affected, with Harvard University losing almost \$1 billion. The president noted that the board of directors had appointed an investment committee to provide better management of our investment.

He also noted that because of the market fluctuations, the investment committee recommended, and the board approved placing the endowment fund into a lower-risk Money Market account until there was greater stability and predictability in the market.

Treasurer Hart had provided an endowment fund update for new participants in the endowment fund as follows: **Bob "Nick" Nicholson, Jr.**, Gold Level; **Brig. Gen. Ron Rand**, Gold Level; **Richard L. "Rick" Fuller**, Silver Level and **Betty Jane Williams**, Silver Level.

Three levels were established by the board in 1998 as follows: Bronze for gifts of \$1000 to \$3000, Silver for gifts over \$3000 and Gold for gifts of \$5000 or more. The goal for the fund is \$300,000 which, when reached, will provide a perpetual source of income to help finance member services.

Ed Johnson reported on the PA Memorial. The Memorial Committee is taking nominations. The nomination procedures are posted on the web page.

A discussion was held about the location of the memorial. Recommendations were made for a memorial at DINFOS, the Pentagon, the Air Force Museum and the Air Force Academy Chapel.

It was noted that the primary goal is to get a memorial established at one location, initially in a memorial hall at DINFOS, and that other locations would be considered for duplicate memorials in the future. Location and size will determine what form the memorial will take.

Chairman Gura advised that there is a noted artist who might be willing to help with this effort when details are finalized on the location of the memorial.

Chairman Gura reported that the following members were elected to the board of directors effective July 1, 2002:

Larry Greer (incumbent), **John Gulick**, **Jim Hart**, **Jim McGuire** (incumbent), **Charlie Powers** and **Joe Purka** (incumbent).

Earlier this year, the Board voted to increase the number of board members from nine to 11 members. This was done in order to increase the number of board members available to support the succession plan.

A plea was made for members, other than the board members, to volunteer and get involved.

The chairman announced that under the succession plan, **Joe Purka** would replace **John Gura** as Chairman of the Board, **Dave Smith** would move up to replace **Purka** as President, and **Rick Fuller** would replace **Smith** as Vice President.

A new Secretary would be voted on during the board meeting which immediately followed the annual meeting (NOTE: **Mike Gannon** was elected and accepted the position of Secretary.)

In his 'State of the Associa-

tion' report, **Chairman Gura** reported that the association was in good financial health and that our membership was steady. He said a renewed emphasis on recruiting and the

addition of a Financial Advisory Committee will improve our near term prospects.

He also said their was "great need" for more people to become involved in Association activities.

"We cannot continue to rely on the same people year after year no matter how willing they are," he said.

In closing, he issued a warning about the Association's long term prospects in light of a dwindling population of potential members. He called for the new board to begin to study how to recruit members in the future and to evaluate what

other steps may be needed to ensure the Association remains a viable organization.

He urged that all options be kept on the table including: taking "alumni" out of the name; offering full memberships to active duty persons; combining membership and resources with other small associations, etc.

"It's time for a top-to-bottom review of our Association, its mission and its activities and how they relate to the future," he said.

Finally, **Chairman Gura** thanked the members of the board during his tenure for their commitment to

Under new business, **Brig. Gen. Rand** was commended for holding his Air Force Public Affairs Council meeting in conjunction with the AFPAAA annual meeting. He also reported that USAFE/PA has offered to support the annual meeting at Ramstein.

After a brief discussion concerning the name of the Association, **C.B. Kelly** asked if we could vote on changing the name. It was agreed that we would need to put such a proposal to the entire membership for a vote.

After lengthy discussion, **Don Brownlee** moved that the board of directors be instructed to begin the process to reopen a review of changing the name of the Air Force Public Affairs Alumni Association. **C. B. Kelly** seconded the motion. During the ensuing discussion there was a review of the last effort to change the name.

There was a discussion of the benefit of conducting a survey of members and of those members who have not renewed to evaluate why they joined or declined to join the Association. The purpose of the evaluation would be to determine if there was a reason to change the name.

More than 60 percent of those voting had opposed a name change during the last vote. Among the issues

raised was a discussion on the goals and objectives of the association, the shortage of active duty members who have joined the Association, and the need to thoroughly evaluate any effort to change the name.

A motion to call the question was unanimously passed. The motion instructed the board to begin the evaluation process passed. **President Purka** assured the membership that the board would keep the membership advised of activities undertaken to follow the will of the members at the meeting.

The members recognized the San Antonio organizing committee and all the volunteers who made this meeting one of the best ever. The members agreed that the volunteers had done an outstanding job.

There being no further business, **Rick Fuller** moved that the annual meeting be adjourned. It was seconded by **Al Eakle** and unanimously approved. The annual meeting was adjourned at 2:50 p.m.
