

Six Seats Open On AFPAAA Board

The terms of six members of the AFPAAA Board of Directors will expire at the end of June. Incumbents Tom Halbert, Jim Hart, Hank Hufnagel, and Pete Petersen, intend to run for another two-year term on the board. Board Chairman Charley Powers and Ron Rand, who was appointed to fulfill the remainder John Gulick's term, will not seek reelection. Gulick died suddenly in 2004.

Full Members of AFPAAA can run for one of the six seats by informing Board Chairman Powers, who heads the nominating committee, of their intentions. Their nomination request should include a short, three or four paragraph resume/biography that promotes their candidacy and would encourage members to vote for them. It should outline their qualifications, what they have done to support AFPAAA, and why they want to serve on the Board.

Election ballots will be sent to the membership by May 1. The outcome of the election will be posted on AFPAAA's web site – www.afpaaa.org – by June 20.

The newly elected board members will begin their term on July 1.

USAF Creates Two-Star Communications Director; One-Star Deputy Is PA Director

Major reorganization and expansion of Air Force Public Affairs and other communications assets, scheduled for completion by July 1, is underway. It is aimed at making them an integral part of operational planning, improving recruiting and internal communications, better informing Americans of the Air Force's engagement in the global war on terrorism and support to the nation, and increasing effectiveness in dealing with national and international news media in Washington, DC.

Eventually a two-star general will be Director of Communications, with a one-star deputy. Brigadier General Erwin F. Lessel III and Col. Michelle D. Johnson have been assigned to those positions. The deputy will also serve as the Director of Public Affairs.

"By ensuring Air Force Public Affairs professionals have an active role in all significant operational planning, decision and assessment points, the Air Force will have a formidable communication ability to proactively provide accurate, timely, and focused information that its publics need to see and hear," said Air Force Chief of Staff, Geneneral T. Michael Moseley.

The revamping will nearly double the size of the current structure, focusing "on integrated communication with people assigned to major areas of future operations, current operations, and outreach."

According to the Air Force, "The new organization will gain a highly qualified media expert to advise senior leadership on communication strategies and a communications integrator to ensure all efforts are planned and synchronized across the Air Staff for maximum effect."

General Lessel was Director of Plans and Programs at Headquarters Air Force Materiel Command, Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio. Prior to that he was Deputy Chief of Staff for Strategic Communications of Multi-National Forces Iraq in Baghdad. Colonel Johnson was Director of Personnel, Air Mobility Command, Scott AFB, Illinois.

Where Southwest goes, the airfares are low – and BWI Airport is a very busy place for Southwest Airlines. That's good for everyone who will fly to AFPAAA's 13th Annual Membership Meeting.

Even better, to compete with Southwest many other carriers feature low fares. So, depending on your departure city, you may be able to fly your airline of choice at a bargain fare.

Southwest is not found on the multiple airline search engines; to check its prices go to www.southwest.com The same applies to

Jet Blue, which does not fly to Baltimore but does go into Dulles from the West Coast.

Occasionally you can get a better fare to the Washington-Baltimore area by going into National or Dulles. If you do, keep in mind that it takes an hour-plus from National to our hotel at Baltimore's Inner Harbor and closer to two hours from Dulles.

Taxis are pricey from either airports, so the cost of getting to Baltimore could wipe out what you save on your airfare and then some.

For those on the East Coast, particularly the Boston-Washington corridor, who prefer to avoid airports Amtrak has a variety of trains to Baltimore and Washington.

First Lieutenant Sarah Small, 25, an Air Force public affairs officer assigned to Langley Air Force Base, Virginia, died September 19, in Egypt, while supporting Exercise Bright. The contractor driver of her vehicle fell asleep, causing an accident that killed her and seriously injured two other airmen from Eglin Air Force Base, Florida. Lieutenant Small, was a graduate of Oakton High School in Vienna, Virginia, and the Virginia Women's Institute for Leadership (VWIL) at Mary Baldwin College in Staunton, Virginia. She was the first VWIL graduate to die while serving on active duty.

Senior Master Sergeant Jack Jones, a Broadcaster, who, prior to his retirement, served as Special Events Chief in Wiesbaden from 1974 to 1977 passed away recently. He is survived by his wife Simone; daughter, Lydia; and two grand children.
