This award, AFPAAA's highest honor, can be given to any member of the Association; it recognizes contributions to AFPAAA far beyond those normally expected of a member – a list of past recipients is in our membership directory and on the AFPAAA web site at www.afpaaa.org/awards.html

Recipients of the McRaney Award are determined by unanimous vote of the Board of Directors. The Award is not a going out of office award. In considering a nominee, neither service on the Board of Directors, chairing a committee, or holding an office, such as president or chairman of the board of directors, is required, conversely, nor do they exclude a member from the award.

Rank, accomplishments, positions, while on active duty or while working for a federal, state, or local government or non-profit entity or religious group or private corporation, will not be considered in determining award recipients. Neither will monetary contributions to AFPAAA in and of themselves be the sole reason for making the award.

While nominations can be made at any time and a presentation does not have to be made every year, to be considered for presentation at the 2017 Annual Membership meeting nominations need to be received by January 1. Submit nominations to AFPAAA's secretary: tom.dolney@centurylink.net

Don Gilleland's New Book Covers Extraordinary Changes Creating Conflicts In America Today

A source for reflection would be a good way to describe AFPAAA member Don Gilleland's fourth book, *America: A Conflicted Nation*, a collection of articles and columns he has written.

His central theme is "Our society is undergoing extraordinary changes ideologically, culturally, morally, and religiously." that ". . . may take many years to smooth out . . ."

As he addresses a variety of topics, including race relations, increased dependence on the government, civility, the economy, our judicial system, technology, and national defense, how you reflect on them may well be governed by your age and life experiences, and be different than Don's.

By juxtaposing the prevailing attitudes and conduct in America one or more generations ago with the attitudes and conduct today he spotlights the conflicts that people and institutions face now. For example, in terms of civility Don posits that "We are becoming an extraordinarily crass, egocentric, cynical and confrontational

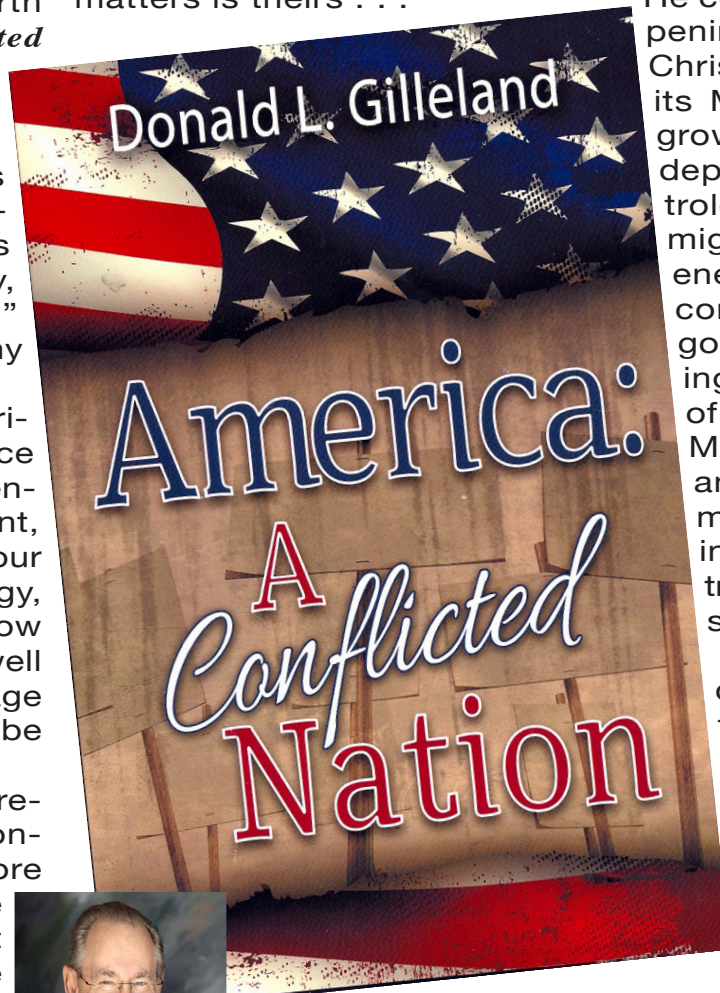
society in which many citizens seem to honestly believe the only opinion that matters is theirs . . ."

sions/confrontations.

Don does not shy away from controversial subjects. He covers what is happening in a mostly Christian America as its Muslim population grows; the nation's dependence on petroleum and what might be its future energy solution; the constant increase in government spending and the growth of Social Security, Medicare, Medicaid; and the effect of military cutbacks, including sequestration, on national security.

Don has strong opinions on the topics he covers, but that should not be a deterrent to a reader as they are well stated and don't detract from a stimulating and good read.

UFOs & Little Green Men Were A Big AF PR Problem

In his article *UFOs are Real! The Air Force Doesn't Exist* AFPAAA founder Dave Shea covers one of the most controversial subjects in AF Public Affairs history. And he should know. Dave was SAF/OI's prime media spokesman for UFOs from 1967 to 1970. In 1969 he shepherded the release of the "Scientific Study of Unidentified Flying Objects," better known as The Condon Report. The report was to close project Blue Book and "More than 20 years of bitter experience with the highly emotional sub-

ject of UFOs . . ." during which the Air Force was subjected to charges of cover up and manipulation.

Dave's article is based on his University of Denver Master's thesis "The UFO Phenomenon: A Study in Public Relations," When first written in 1972 the article was denied clearance by the Air Force as being "unduly critical about the Air Force's handling of the situation." Thomas E. LaRock

Tom LaRock, who served 25-years in the Air Force, died June 19. He was 62.

Tom was born in Rochester, New York. He graduated from Bishop Flaget High School in Chillicothe, Ohio. He earned a bachelor's degree in journalism from Ohio University in 1976 and a master's degree in communications from Webster University in 1985.

His Air Force career began in 1977 as chief of internal information and media relations at Andrews Air Force Base, Maryland. Subsequent assignments included working on the return of the American embassy hostages from Iran, serving in Saudi Arabia during Desert Shield, and as chief of media for NATO's Allied Forces Southern Europe.



Tom's final assignment was as Deputy Director of Public Affairs for Air Mobility Command. He retired in 2002 as a lieutenant colonel.

He was then employed as a communications specialist for the Boeing Company in St. Louis.

In 2006 he joined the Defense Finance and Accounting Services. As DFAS Director of Corporate Communications, Tom directed internal and external communication activities at 13 locations throughout the United States, Europe and the Pacific, as well as the legislative liaison function and Freedom of Information Act program.

He is survived by his wife, Maria Jan, and sons, Anthony and Alfredo Parris. Memorial contributions in Tom's name can be sent to the Wounded Warrior Project.

Tom's passing was a shock to those of us who served with him in the air mobility community. There are probably less than a handful of public affairs members who were as knowledgeable about air mobility and global reach as Tom.

Knowing Tom's unquestioned capabilities and that the Desert Shield story of the early transport buildup of troops and equipment by air, land, and sea, needed to be told, I deployed him to Saudi Arabia to serve as the PA point man for the relatively newly formed US Transportation Command. He was quickly commandeered to CENTCOM commander General Schwarzkopf's media team.

Tom was a tireless, unpretentious team player who left us way too early. He is very much missed!

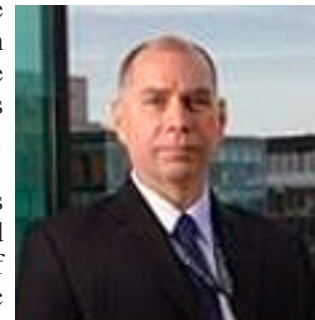
This makes me sad. One of the first guys I worked with on my first duty assignment. I didn't know squat and he was so nice and patient.

Larry Orluskie, served 24-years in the Air Force and was the Department of Homeland Security Deputy Director of Communications and Public Affairs when he died May 12 at Johns Hopkins University Hospital, Baltimore, Maryland. He was 56.

Larry was born in Shamokin, Pennsylvania, and entered the Air Force after high school graduation. He had many Public Affairs assignments including NCOIC of Public Affairs at McGuire AFB, Public Relations Superintendent for the 436th Airlift Wing, Dover AFB, and the 51st Fighter Wing, Spangdahlem AB. His last assignment was in the Pentagon as a Media Operations Action Officer. He retired in 2001 as a master sergeant.



He held a number of positions at DHS until being selected as the Deputy Director of Communications and Public Affairs in January 2014. Before joining DHS in 2004, he worked for WBOC-TV in Baltimore and the Internal Revenue Service.

Larry is survived by his wife, Michelle Walczak; three daughters, Sophie, Emilee, and Lydia; his former wife, Christine Griffin Orluskie, and four grandchildren. Remembrances in his name may be made to the American Heart Association.

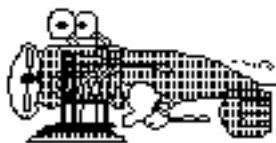

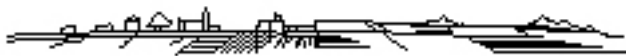
