

\$5,000 Anonymous Donation To Dalton Scholarship Fund To Benefit All Active, Guard & Reserve Public Affairs Specialities

“We are off to a great start thanks to the \$5,000 check we received from one of our AFPAAA Life Members,” observed Chuck Merlo who heads the Brigadier General H. J. Dalton, Jr. Scholarship Program. The donation was made anonymously.

“Now it’s up to us to get procedures governing the program completed so we can receive requests for grants before the end of the year and make the first awards for 2022,” he said.

AFPAAA’s Dalton Scholarship program will make \$5,000 available each year for individual awards of up to \$1,000 to those serving in the Band, Broadcasting, Visual Information/ Combat Camera, and traditional Information Public Affairs specialties.

“The objective is to advance their skills and enhance their duty performance which benefits the Air Force,” Melo explained. The awards may be used for courses, seminars, and workshops from colleges, universities, and professional institutes and organizations.

Hall Of Fame Honors Bands, Broadcasting, Information/Public Affairs & Visual Information/Combat Camera With First Inductees

Air Force Public Affairs Alumni Association Chairman Jay DeFrank and Air Force Director of Public Affairs Brigadier General Pat Ryder have announced the first group of inductees for the new Air Force Public Affairs Hall of Fame. Included are 15 enlisted, officer, and civilian men and women from Band, Broadcasting, Visual Information/Combat Camera, and traditional Information/Public Affairs specialties who made significant and lasting contributions to Air Force Public Affairs' history and traditions. Establishment of the Air Force Public Affairs Hall of Fame was initiated by AFPAAA.

The inductees were chosen by a committee of representatives from all the specialties included in Public Affairs. Art Forster of AFPAAA chaired the effort, other members were Renee Tyron, AF Combat Camera Association; Pat Miner, AF Broadcasters Alumni, Larry Hill, AF Musicians Association, and Judy Bivens, John Dorian, Clem Gaines and Johnny Whitaker of AFPAAA.

Two well-known Air Force leaders, General Hap Arnold, former commanding general of the U.S. Army Air Forces, and Brigadier General Jerry Dalton, the first career public affairs officer to be Air Force Director of Public Affairs, head the group.

Other inductees include the former Assistant Secretary of Defense for Public Affairs and retired Lieutenant Colonel Bill Greener; retired GM-13 Ken Hackman, the 'Godfather' of Air Force visual information; Lieutenant Colonel Alf Heiberg, from 1941 to 1944 the first leader of the Army Air Forces Band; Stephen Leo, the first Air Force Chief of Public Relations, and Chief Master Sergeant Chuck Lucas, editor of the Military Airlift Command and later the Air Force News Services from 1964 to 1972.

Also in the initial inductees are Colonel Bill McGinty, who led Air Force public affairs operations in Vietnam and Far East Air Forces; Chief Master Sergeant Doug Morrell, who was in three wars as a combat camera cinema-



tographer; Brigadier General William Nuckols, who headed public affairs for the World War II Allied Expeditionary Air Forces, and Colonel Barney Oldfield, who was in charge of press operations for General Eisenhower and Field Marshal Montgomery during World War II.

Completing the group are Alice Price, the first civilian to be named Chief of the Air Force Arts and Museum Branch in the Pentagon; Buzz Rizer, a retired lieutenant colonel and the longtime Director of the American Forces Information Service; Reed Switzer, the first Public Affairs NCO promoted to both Senior Master Sergeant and Chief Master Sergeant, and Colonel Reade Tilley, who directed Air Force Public Affairs during the Berlin Airlift and later for Strategic Air Command under General Curtis LeMay.

A video display of the newly named and future Hall of Fame members will be a prominent part of the Air Force Heritage Wall which is now under construction at the Defense Information School, Fort Meade, Maryland.

Each year a new group of Hall of Fame inductees will be recognized at AFPAAA's Annual Membership Meeting.

Because of COVID-19, the initial group will be honored at the next meeting which is scheduled for September 29 to October 1, 2022, in Fairborn, Ohio and Wright-Patterson AFB.

Senior Airman Rebeckah Medeiros Garners Public Affairs ‘Best of the Best’ For 2020 In First Enlistment

Senior Airman Rebeckah T. Medeiros is quite unique, she went from a basic training enlistee in August 2018 to become the first Airman 1st Class to receive the Brigadier General James W. Hart, Jr. Best of the Best Award as the tops in Air Force Public Affairs in 2020.

Airman Medeiros earned the honor while she was a broadcast journalist for the 18th Wing Public Affairs office, Kadena Air Base, Japan.

But she did much more than that title says.

In her brief time with the 18th Wing she has been a teacher, an equipment manager, and a cost saver, as well a flight-qualified videographer/photographer.

Included among the many accomplishments that earned her the Best of the Best award, Airman Medeiros strengthened bilateral relationships when she mentored Japanese university students in the first virtual language exchange at Kadena.

She taught 891 first term airmen in 42 classes about Air Force Social Media policy and the importance of not violating operations security.

In 20 AFSC merger broadcast training sessions she ensured that seven NCOs were fully mission qualified.

She revamped management of \$1.5M in resources by identifying and fixing gaps to increase the unit's ability to dominate the information battlespace.

Her work in overhauling the TV studio by realigning equipment and expanding strategic messaging options saved \$30K.

The airman was responsible for a major Covid-19 communications effort that reached 72,000 personnel through 16 educational videos featuring experts, mitigation techniques, and wellness strategies.

Her documentation of the command's bilateral Combat



Search and Rescue mission capabilities reached 488,000 people, and one of her images was an *Airman Magazine's* photo of the week.

During 2020 she was named a Special Operations Command Pacific Superior Performer for her photo and video imagery that projected lethality and generated credible deterrence.

Presentation of the Best of the Best Award to Airman Medeiros was made on April 9th by Brigadier General Joel L. Carey, Commander of the 18th Wing at Kadena.

She has been reassigned since then and began her new assignment in May with the 23rd Wing Public Affairs Office

at Moody AFB, Georgia.

With a father who spent 13 years in the Marine Corps and retired as an Army chief warrant officer after 13 years, plus a sister who spent four years in the Navy, it is not surprising that Airman Medeiros is in the military.

She was born in Apple Valley, California, and lived throughout the United States during her father's career.

After graduating from James Campbell High School in Ewa Beach, Hawaii, she attended the

University of Alabama for a year then "decided it was finally time to join the military after thinking about it for years".

Each year SAF/PA selects the individual who will receive AFPAAA's Best of the Best Award which recognizes the top officer, civilian, or enlisted person in Air Force Public Affairs for professional excellence and significant contributions to the effectiveness of the Air Force mission.

Funding for the award is provided by Lockheed Martin Corporation. In addition to the trophy, each recipient receives a \$1,000 check and a Life Membership in AFPAAA.

John T. Correll

John Correll, who was a Public Affairs officer during his twenty year Air Force career, died from pancreatic cancer April 5. He was 81.

He was born in Conover, North Carolina, and earned a bachelor degree in history from Lenoir Rhyne College in Hickory and a master's degree in communications from Michigan State University. During college and following graduation he was a reporter for the Hickory Daily Record.

John began his Air Force career in 1962 when he earned his commission through Officer Training School. His subsequent assignments included Thailand during the Vietnam conflict, a one-year Education With Industry internship at *Air Force Magazine*, editorship of *Airman Magazine*, and his final assignment as chief of editorial services for the American Forces Information Service. He retired as a lieutenant colonel in 1982.

He began an eighteen year career at Air Force Magazine in 1984 as senior editor. Two years later he was named editor in chief, a post he held until retiring in 2002. In addition to editing the magazine, he wrote many of AFA's white papers, reports, and annual policy statements, and was senior staff advisor on defense matters to the association's executive committee and board of directors.

A prolific writer, he continued to contribute articles to *Air Force Magazine* until his passing.

John, with Bill Greener and Frank Jennings, was selected as one of the first three recipients of AFPA's President's Award which is presented to individuals who are leaders in their field who impacted Air Force Public Affairs.

He is survived by his wife of 49 years, Gina; daughter, Donna, and granddaughter, Rae. Burial will be at Arlington National Cemetery. Donations in John's memory may be made to the Lustgarten Foundation for Pancreatic Cancer Research at <https://lustgarten.org/donate/>

I met John in early 1966 at the Boston University Air Force Short Course. That was handy for



me a few years later. John was editing Airman and he brought his photographer with him to McChord AFB where the 25th NORAD Region controlled the SAGE blockhouse, widespread radar sites and interceptor squadrons, guarding our Pacific NW and up into Canada. Having our unit featured in Airman pleased our commander, to say the least. John's work at Airman was outstanding, but he really

hit his stride post-retirement, when he became editor of Air Force Magazine and a respected senior influencer of AFA's policies and practices. Not one to seek personal publicity, in that position he sparked successful public opposition to the Smithsonian's plans to negatively display the B-29 Enola Gay with biased information about its nuclear mission and U.S. policy near the end of WWII. After retiring as editor he produced more than a hundred deeply researched, tightly written, informative and gutsy monthly articles for the magazine on a wide range of Air Force history topics. I enjoyed our email conversations over the years, and was honored a few years ago when he drove to Tysons' Corners for breakfast with me at AFPAAA's conference hotel. John never joined AFPAAA, but a lot of our members recognized him and stopped by the table to greet him, which he clearly enjoyed. John told me last year that he was seriously ill and would not live much longer. Even with that warning it was a hard hit to be notified that he'd gone. Over the past few decades he had contributed tremendously to so many Air Force members' understanding of our heritage. Others will follow in his footsteps, but John Correll won't be, and can't be replaced.

James M. Fillmore

Jim Fillmore, who had a distinguished career in uniform, first in the Navy then in the Air Force, and as an Air Force civil servant, died February 24th of a heart attack while quarantined for COVID-19. He was 87.

He was born and grew up in Hope, Michigan. Before joining the Navy he played minor league baseball.

After serving four years in the Navy, including duty on the aircraft carrier USS Midway as a journalist, he returned to Michigan to work on a newspaper.

He resumed his military career in 1966 in the Air Force that included duty in Vietnam, adding 21 years to his Navy service, until he retired as a chief master sergeant in 1977.

Jim then began a 25 year civil service career with Air Force Systems Command Public Affairs, Andrews AFB, Maryland, until he retired as a GM-13 in 1992.

He is survived by his wife of 45 years, Maria; sons Daniel and James; daughter Brenda; four grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren.

COVID-19 Restrictions At National Cemeteries Relaxed, Check Before You Go

Since the onset of COVID-19 eighteen months ago access and screening procedures at National Cemeteries across the nation have recently gone from very restrictive to more liberal and open. If you will be attending an interment, honoring the site of a friend or relative, or just visiting a nearby National Cemetery, use the links below to get the current status, and consider making a phone call to the specific cemetery you are going to for a final check before your depart.

Arlington National Cemetery's is as fully open as possible. As of the end of May it had no limit on attending graveside funeral services however mourners were still limited to 50 inside the Joint Base Myer-Henderson Hall Old Post Chapel, and to two family members in the ANC administration building. The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, the President John F. Kennedy Gravesite, and exhibits in the Memorial Amphitheater and Welcome Center are fully open. Masks are required at indoor venues and visitors should enter through official access points with screening conducted either inside or outside the Welcome Center.

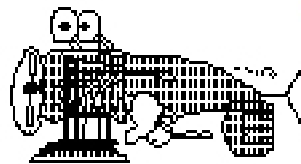

From draft riots, to the posse committatus act of 1878, the WWI Veterans Bonus March and Kent State, use of military force on civilians has always raised questions and controversy. Air University's summer **Strategic Studies Quarterly** at <https://www.airuniversity.af.edu/SSQ/> explores the subject thoroughly with articles including "Civil-Military Relations in the United States: What Senior Leaders Need to Know (and Usually Don't)" which discusses how to improve civilian-military understanding; "The Line Held: Civil-Military Relations in the Trump Administration" covers the lasting effects of Trump treating the military as a political ally; and "Maximum Toxicity: Civil-Military Relations in the Trump Era" which explores the policy obstructions Trump faced from active and retired officers that corroded civil-military trust.
