

Major Board Shifts – Mike Caldwell Resigns, Mark Foutch To VP, Mike Cox Added To Board As Secretary

The scope and time demands of his new job, as well as personal reasons, made it impossible for Mike Caldwell to give proper attention to his duties as a member of the AFPAAA Board of Directors and as it's vice president, resulting in his resignation from the board in November. His departure from the AFPAAA leadership progression created a vacancy on the board and moved secretary Mark Foutch to the vice presi-

Elections Coming: Six Board Seats Open; Nominees Sought By Feb. 1

AFPAAA's Board of Directors election is in three months. Any Full Member of AFPAAA in good standing can run for one of the six open seats, which carry a two-year term.

Potential candidates should make their candidacy known by February 1 to the nominating committee headed by Sam Giammo. E-mail nom-

inations should be sent to samgiammo@afpaaa.org

Individuals seeking office should include a short, three or four paragraph resume/biography that would encourage members to vote for them if accepted by the committee for placement on the ballot. They should outline their qualifications; how they have supported AFPAAA; and why they want to be on the Board of Directors. Nominations should include a head and shoulders picture in either jpeg, TIFF, or a hard copy suitable for scanning.

All potential candidates should understand that by becoming a member of the board it is implicit they are willing to enter the leadership progression to become secretary, vice president, president, and ultimately chairman of the board.

Election ballots will be in the April issue of AFPAAA News & Notes. Results of the election will be announced at the business session of AFPAAA's 18th Annual Membership Meeting, Saturday, May 14, in Fairfield, California.

Those elected will begin their two-yeartermsonJuly1. Incumbents Neil Buttimer, Mike Cox, and Mark Foutch are running for reelection. Alan DeFend, Sam Giammo, and Christine Queen are not running.

During 26 years in the Air Force, his assignments included two tours at the Pentagon and contingency deployments to Grenada, Desert Storm, and Somalia. Mike retired in 1998 as a colonel. His final assignment was at Scott AFB, Illinois, where he was Director of Public Affairs for Air Mobility Command.

Aerial Port Squadron Admin Officer To Diplomat: State Dept Award Caps Don Bishop's Diverse Career

How do you go from an admin officer at a McGuire AFB Aerial Post Squadron in 1968 to a key diplomatic position in Afghanistan in 2010? Ask AFPAAA Life Member Don Bishop, with some interesting detours along the way in a 42-year career, he did just that.

He got an AFROTC commission in 1968 and was assigned to Mc-Guire AFB, New Jersey. The Vietnam War was on and in less than a year Don was the admin officer for the 37th Security Police Squadron at Phu Cat AB.

Next was DINFOS, followed by Maxwell AFB, Alabama, where he was AFROTC's Chief of Public Information. His next stop was as IO at Kwang Ju, AB Korea. Then came a major turning point in his career, an AFIT master's degree program and four years teaching history at the Air Force Academy.

Don left the Air Force in 1979 to join the Foreign Service. With the U.S. Information Agency and the Department of State, he served in Hong Kong, Korea, and Taiwan. As the Country Public Affairs Officer, he led public affairs and public diplomacy, in Bangladesh, Nigeria, China, and Afghanistan.

Don was the foreign policy advisor to the Commandant of the Marine Corps then held the same position with USAF Chief of Staff, General Norton Schwartz in 2008-2009 prior to deploying to the American Em-

bassy in Kabul, Afghanistan. As Acting Director of Communication and Public Diplomacy, he led the public diplomacy and strategic communications effort for five months until the arrival of former CNN and ABC correspondent David Ensor as the new Director. The two

worked together for five months until Don returned to the United States.

When he retired last fall as a member of the State Department's Senior Foreign Service in Public Diplomacy he received the Secretary of State's Career Achievement Award.

From The President's Pen

Dear AFPAAA friends,

By the time you read this message, you will be reflecting on the holiday season and looking to a new year of challenges just as are our fellow military men and women deployed to hot spots around the globe; I am sure you have kept them in your thoughts and prayers.

A recent Air Force Times article listed deployment days spent in 2010 by various Air Force specialties. Public Affairs, broadcast, and combat camera personnel were all listed in the top 25 percentile for number of days deployed. They are doing a great job under very demanding conditions. The "new normal," as some have called it, is placing heavy demands on all our aircraft and the crews that fly them as well as virtually every support specialty.

I was privileged to visit Air Mobility Command (AMC) headquarters recently with a civilian delegation from the Travis AFB area. The AMC senior leadership said that because of its rough terrain, long distances, roadside ambushes and IEDs posing peril to friendly forces convoys there is an insatiable demand for logistics by air and air drop in Afghanistan. Airlift and air drop are not the most efficient means of moving vast quantities of supplies, but in those situations they are often the most effective and timely.

At the same time, air evacuation of wounded warriors has reached new highs in speed of patient transfer and numbers of lives saved. Air refueling aircraft are steadfastly supporting our combat aircraft as they execute close air support. In short, the air mobility mission is providing our warriors on the ground and in the air the vital support they need. So I think it is fitting and timely that we will focus on those operational missions at our 18th Annual Membership Meeting, May 12-14, 2011, in Fairfield, California, the home of AMC's Travis AFB. I hope as many of you as possible will make a point to be there.

SAF/PA Director Brigadier General (Select) Les Kodlick expects to join us in Fairfield. He recently met with Dave Shea and Neil Buttimer of the AFPAAA Membership Development Committee and Art Forster, to discuss how we might improve the association's value to those currently serving in the Air Force. Once we have that information, we will prepare our recommendations to the board on membership development and the proposal to change the name of the organization. We'll keep you posted.

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
