Gene Sands Captures Show Biz History With Wally Boag

A unique slice of America's entertainment history is captured by AFPAAA Lifetime Founder Gene Sands as co-author with the subject of "Wally Boag, Clown Prince of Disneyland."

Unlike Eddie Foy, George M. Cohan's family. Abbot and Costello, and the many other stars who emerged from vaudeville, Wally Boag, who died in 2011, is not a household name. Yet, he was the quintessential song, dance, and co-

medic stage artist.

After refining his skills for 20 years in theaters and night clubs around America and internationally, Wally became a permanent fixture at Disnevland.

He was the star of the Golden Horseshoe Revue. From 1955 through early 1982, when he retired, Wally did 40,000 performances in the show, a feat that none of the legends of entertainment in the past, or those who may come in the future, could duplicate in any venue.

He details how, in London in 1947, a twelve-year-old Julie Andrews joined him for the balloon animals portion of his act, giving her the opportunity to stop the show with her singing.

Wally was one of Walt Disney's favorite performers and that relationship is woven throughout the book. His tal-

were displayed on the Mickey Mouse Club and voicing some of the animatronics in the park.

He appeared in a number of Disney films, including wearing a life-like mask to do the stunt work for Fred McMurray in the flying sequences of the Absent Minded Professor.

This biography is fun, it is not verbose, Wally tells his story, from when he was first bitten by the bug to perform as a child through many stops until he reached Disneyland, in a jaunty, easy to read style, replete with pictures.

But, the book is not just about Wally's story. There are three other mini-stories in the book.

Walt Disney choose Wally to star in the Golden Horseshoe Review before Disneyland opened, so, as he details his

27-year-career in the review you get an insight into the growth of the park in its early

years.

Then there is the Steve Martin connection. Martin, who starting at age ten working at Disneyland selling quide books, did the introduction to the book and credits Wally with being a major influence on his career.





An internationally known speaker on family values, military affairs, and moral leadership and author of Leadership Is ALL About People, he is president of the instructional program of the same title, a seminar for people who desire to impact the lives of others. He is also ambassador at large and executive director emeritus of Military Ministry, a division of Campus Crusade International. A retired Air Force brigadier general and jet pilot, during his 30-year military career, he led an Air Force acrobatic team, was an assistant football coach at the U.S. Air Force Academy, escorted home five flights of returning POWs from Vietnam, served as special assistant to three four-star Navy admirals and one chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and was director of Air Force Public Affairs.

Judy Bivens has been the Veterans Service Officer for McNairy County, Tennessee since 2004. She assists veterans, their surviving spouses and family members in accessing benefits through the Department of Veteran Affairs. She joined the Air Force in 1975, retrained into public affairs as a first-termer in 1980, and subsequently served in all areas of the career field. Her assignments included Barksdale AFB, Louisiana; Reese AFB, Texas; Ankara Air Station, Turkey; Yokota Air Base, Japan; and Headquarters, Recruiting Service, Randolph AFB, Texas. Judy was promoted to chief master sergeant in 1994, and became the public affairs resource manager for Air Mobility Command, Scott AFB, Ill. In 1998, she became the chief of enlisted public affairs assignments at the Air Force Personnel Center, Randolph AFB. Judy retired from the Air Force in 2001 and was an associate professor of management studies at the University of Tennessee, McNairy Center until 2005.

Larry Clavette is a Life Member of AFPAAA. He has been in Air Force Public Affairs nearly 35 years, and is the director of the Air Force Public Affairs Agency, San Antonio, Texas. Prior to his current assignment, he was SAF/PA assistant deputy director of public affairs. Larry joined SAF/PA in 2001 as a policy writer. John Gura is a Lifetime Founder of AFPAAA. He spent 21 years in the Air Force retiring as a Lt. Colonel in 1983. As a PA, John held wing, MAJCOM, and SAF/PA jobs including stints as Chief of the Chicago field office and Department Director and Deputy Commander of DINFOS. Subsequently, he held corporate marketing and video production positions until helping found HomeSafe Environmental, Inc., a California environmental training and testing firm in 2000. He developed and continues to provide support for the AFPAAA web site and the Oral History Program. John served previously as Association President and Chairman.

Jim Hart is a Lifetime Founder of AFPAAA and has been active in the leadership of AFPAAA since it was formed. He has served the Association as President and Chairman of the Board, and has been treasurer, for the past 10 years. Although board membership is not required to hold the office of Treasurer, he believes that all officers of the association should stand for election to the board. He retired in 1995 as Mobilization Assistant to the Director, SAF/PA, after 36 years of service.

Johnny Whitaker is a Life Member of AFPAAA and Director of Communications for Lockheed Martin Aeronautics Company's Marietta, Georgia, operations (AF Plant #6, collocated with Dobbins ARB). He joined Lockheed Martin in 2008 after nearly 35 years as an Air Force Public Affairs officer and senior civilian. Garry Lee Bowers

Garry Bowers, a Lifetime Founder of AFPAAA, passed away after a lengthy illness, December 24, in Monongalia General Hospital, Morgantown, West Virginia. He was 73.

He had two very successful careers: one in broadcasting, the other in the Air Force Reserve. A native of Morgantown, while earning a degree in Industrial Management from West Virginia University, he began his broadcasting career

at WCLG in Morgantown. After graduating in 1961, he continued at the station and became its sales manager in 1963.

Garry was a leading air personality in Morgantown, broadcasting news, election results, and community events. He was promoted to station manager, and then bought the AMFM station in 1983, becoming its owner-operator. A member of the West Virginia Broadcasters Hall of Fame, he hosted the very popular "Old Trading Post" on WCLG AM

for 25 years and celebrated 53 years of broadcasting in October.

His military career began in the West Virginia Army National Guard in 1966, as an armor scout. He transferred to Air National Guard in 1970 as an Information Officer for the 130th Special Operations Group. Subsequent active duty service found him at Air Force Systems Command and then in SAF/PA. Garry's final assignment was as the Reserve Deputy Director of Public Affairs. He retired in 1998 as a colonel.

Garry is survived by his wife of 50 years, Linda Britton Bowers, three children, sons Marc and Michael, and daughter Heather Bowers, and his sister Ann Rea Summers. Interment was at Britton Cemetery. Garry can be remembered through donations in his name to either Spruce Street United Methodist Church, 386 Spruce St., Morgantown, WV 26505 or to any charity which benefits the welfare of animals.

I always enjoyed speaking with Garry when I was in the Pentagon and at various USAFR function. When he retired in 1998, I had the honor of setting up his retirement ceremony. Garry was a great guy and supporter of our Air Force.

I became aware of Garry and his talents in the late 1980s when I had the honor to serve as Director of PA for AF Systems Command. Garry was a Guard Major and wanted to expand his horizons. We brought him on board and he was a natural,

with an unparalleled mix of radio, business and PR savvy. There wasn't a member of that talented AFSC/PA staff who didn't learn something new from Garry. Everyone looked forward to his tours of duty.

Later, as AFSC closed, he moved to SAF/PA Media Relations, was promoted to Colonel and became one of the stalwart Reserve Colonels of that decade - or any other. During those years he volunteered on many occasions to assist, above and beyond his normal duties in the Pentagon, in helping instruct PA professionals in field training at Camp Bullis. His message was a simple one - know your audience, focus on your customer, and the message will come. And it always did! Rest in peace, my dear friend, for your mark on the West Virginia Radio Hall of Fame and Air Force Public Affairs is indelible.

Jim's life had a Horatio Alger quality. He was born in rural Blakely, Georgia His father died when he was 6. When his mother could not take care of her three children, Jim spent his growing up years during the depression in the Methodist Orphan's Home in Macon, Georgia. As a teen, before he enlisted, he worked on

> aircraft at the Jacksonville Florida Naval Air Station.

> Jim was slated for training as an Aviation Cadet until, to his disappointment, he failed the eye test. He did, however, qualify for aircrew duty and served as and aircraft observer with the 24th Combat Mapping Squadron at Clark Field in the Philippines.

He left the military for a short time, but the job market

was tough and he reentered active duty. During the Korean war he flew reconnaissance missions as a photo gunner in what was then the United States Air Force.

The turning point in his career came when a major talked Jim into taking the OCS exam. He passed the exam and graduated with honors as one of the top three members of class of 54-A at Lackland AFB, Texas.

His first assignment was as photographic officer at Shaw AFB, South Carolina. While at Shaw, he completed his bachelor of science degree and ended

his tour there in 1958 as assistant base information officer.

He was selected for the AFIT graduate degree program and attended Boston University. He received a masters in journalism in 1959.

Subsequent assignments included McGuire AFB, New Jersey, where he arranged the welcome when Elvis Presley's returned from Army service in Germany. He was involved in the Evelyn and Jim In Darmstadt, Germany



airlift of arms and journalists to Calcutta, when Chinese forces crossed India's border.

In 1965 he became Deputy Director Of Information for AFROTC at Maxwell AFB, Alabama

From 1967-70 while at Bolling AFB, Jim was Chief, Editorial Division, Command Services Unit, and then Editor of AIRMAN magazine.

He served as Senior Information Advisor to the Vietnamese Air Force, In 1971 he moved to Hawaii where he was Southeast Asia Plans Officer, and then Chief of the Operations Branch in CINCPAC's Public-Legislative Affairs Office at Camp H. M. Smith.

Jim was part of the return of the POW's from Vietnam, including one flight from Hanoi. He then became Chief of Community Relations in SAF/OI.

His last assignment was as Editor-in-Chief of the European Edition of STARS AND STRIPES, the job he loved most.

He moved to Hawaii in 1977. Jim is survived by his wife Evelyn; sons, Bruce and Brent Taylor, and Emory Damron; his brother Thomas, and his sister Ann Cummings; two grandchildren, and three great grandchildren.

Jim will be interred at Arlington National Cemetery later this spring. Donations in his memory can be made to any organization that aids veterans.

"Nice guy...low-key...talented" are among the adjectives that come to mind when asked if you knew Jim Taylor. He spoke softly, and often this was reflected in his written prose. But, he also was "solid and dependable." His Air Force assignments bear this out. He belied the squeaky wheel maxim. Instead, whether behind an editor's desk or in some makeshift space on a foreign shore, he delivered success -- much to the delight of his superiors and co-workers.

Russ Turner of Lake Worth, Florida, who was an Air Force pilot for six years followed by 20 years as a Public Affairs Officer, died June 8. He was 81. He flew B-29 weather reconnaissance missions in England, Air Defense Command C-121 "picket ships" off the coast of California, and Tactical Air Command C-130s.



Russ' Public Affairs assignments included public information officer with NATO defense forces, Iceland; the Air Force Ballistic Missile Division, Los Angeles Air Force Station; and Aeronautical Systems Division, Wright Patterson AFB, Ohio. He headed Air Force Logistics Command's Public Affairs Office until he retired as a colonel.

He worked for Frank Wright, Inc., one of the oldest public relations

firms in Florida, until joining Colee & Satory, where he was director of public relations and an account executive, until retiring in 1986.

Russ is survived by sons John and Stephen, three grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. He was buried in Gordonsville Cemetery, Gordonsville, Tennessee. RussTurner was a quiet, soft-spoken leader whom I'll remember not only for his public affairs expertise, but also for his great talent as a portrait artist.

It was an exciting time to be at ASD as we introduced the F-15, F-16, B-1, and A-10. Russ moved from ASD across Highway 444 to the Patterson side to head up Air Force Logistics Command's public affairs operations.

He was a true professional and will be missed.


After we renew old friendships


